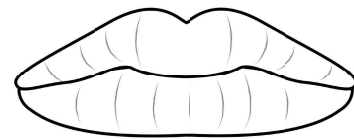


SPEECH

PRACTICING THE /M/ SOUND

This is the “yummy” sound. To produce the /m/ sound, your lips should be together and your VOICE should be ON.

PRACTICING THE /B/ SOUND

This is the “bouncing” sound. To produce the /b/ sound, your lips start together and then allow the air to travel quickly as you open your lips. Your VOICE should be ON.

PRACTICING THE /P/ SOUND

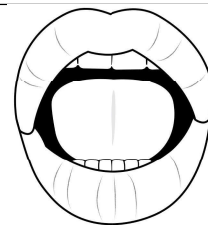
This is the “popping” sound. To produce the /p/ sound, your lips start together and then allow the air to travel quickly as you open your lips. Your VOICE should be OFF.

PRACTICING THE /K/ SOUND

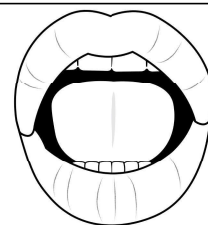
This is the “coughing” sound. To produce the /k/ sound, pull your tongue back. Allow the air to flow quickly with your mouth open. Your VOICE should be OFF.

PRACTICING THE /G/ SOUND

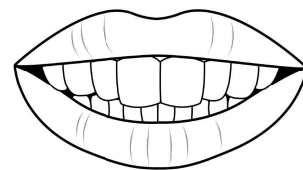
This is the “gulping” sound. To produce the /g/ sound, pull your tongue back. Allow the air to flow quickly with your mouth open. Your VOICE should be ON.

PRACTICING THE /S/ SOUND

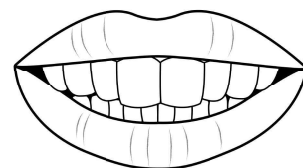
This is the “snake” sound. To produce the /s/ sound, place the tip of your tongue slightly behind your teeth and “smile” with your teeth together. Allow the air to flow over the middle of your tongue and out the front of your mouth. Your VOICE should be OFF.

PRACTICING THE /Z/ SOUND

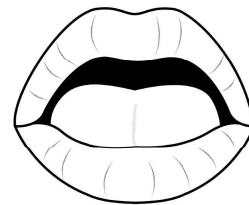
This is the “buzzing” sound. To produce the /z/ sound, place the tip of your tongue slightly behind your teeth and “smile” with your teeth together. Allow the air to flow over the middle of your tongue and out the front of your mouth. Your VOICE should be ON.

PRACTICING THE /H/ SOUND

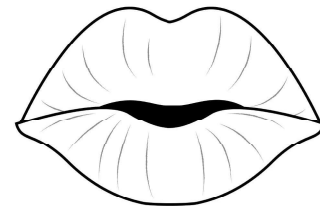
This is the “laughing” sound. To produce the /h/ sound, allow air to come out of your mouth. Your mouth should be slightly open. Your VOICE should be OFF.

PRACTICING THE /W/ SOUND

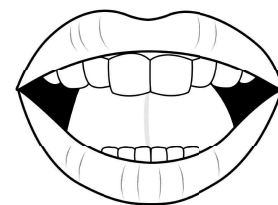
This is the “blowing” sound. To produce the /w/ sound, round your lips and allow the sound to come out of a small opening. Your VOICE should be ON.

PRACTICING THE /N/ SOUND

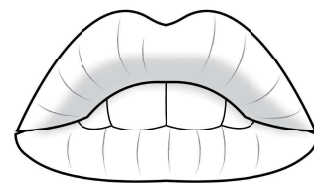
This is the “nose” sound. To produce the /n/ sound, place your tongue on the roof of your mouth and allow the sound to travel through your nose. Your VOICE should be ON.

PRACTICING THE /F/ SOUND

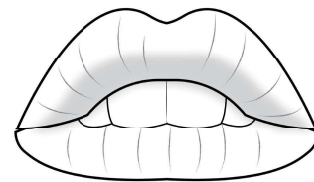
This is the “windy” sound. To produce the /f/ sound, place your top teeth over your bottom lip and allow the air to flow out of your mouth. Your VOICE should be OFF.

PRACTICING THE /V/ SOUND

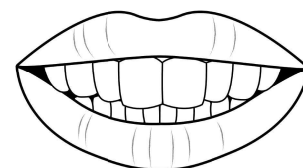
This is the “vacuum” sound. To produce the /v/ sound, place your top teeth over your bottom lip and allow the air to flow out of your mouth. Your VOICE should be ON.

PRACTICING THE /T/ SOUND

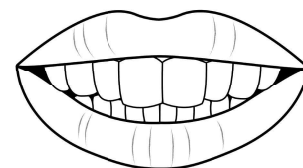
This is the “tick-tock” sound. To produce the /t/ sound, place the tip of your tongue on the bump behind your teeth. Allow the air to be released in a short burst out the front of your mouth. Your VOICE should be OFF.

PRACTICING THE /D/ SOUND

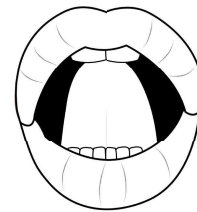
This is the “drumming” sound. To produce the /d/ sound, place the tip of your tongue on the bump behind your teeth. Allow the air to be released in a short burst out the front of your mouth. Your VOICE should be ON.

PRACTICING THE /L/ SOUND

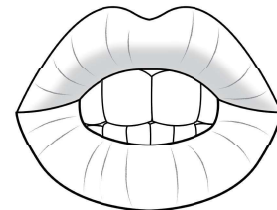
This is the “singing” sound. To produce the /l/ sound, place the tip of your tongue directly behind your top teeth. Your mouth should be slightly open. Your VOICE should be ON.

PRACTICING THE /SH/ SOUND

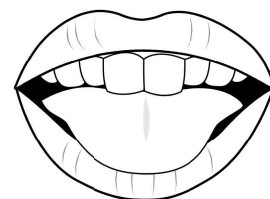
This is the “quiet” sound. To produce the /sh/ sound, round your lips and slightly raise your tongue. Allow the sound to come out of the front of your mouth. VOICE should be OFF.

PRACTICING THE /TH/ SOUND

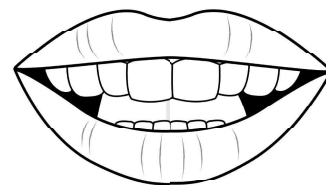
This is the “tongue sandwich” sound. To produce the /th/ sound, place your tongue between your teeth and allow the air to flow out of your mouth. Your VOICE may be ON or OFF.

PRACTICING THE /CH/ SOUND

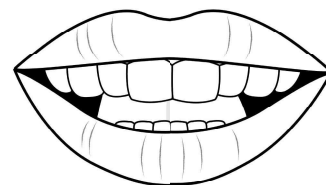
This is the “choo-choo” sound. To produce the /ch/ sound, place the tip of your tongue on the bump behind your teeth. Slightly round your lips and allow the air to be released in a short burst out the front of your mouth. Your VOICE should be OFF.

PRACTICING THE /J/ SOUND

This is the “jumping” sound. To produce the /j/ sound, place the tip of your tongue on the bump behind your teeth. Slightly round your lips and allow the air to be released in a short burst out the front of your mouth. Your VOICE should be ON.



SPEECH

PRACTICING THE /R/ SOUND

This is the “pirate” sound. To produce the /r/ sound, raise the back of your tongue to the roof of your mouth. Your tongue should be pulled back and tightened. Your VOICE should be ON.
